## Former park warden's new mystery novel based out of CB Highlands National Park

George Mercer, a former park warden, has just released *Dyed in The Green*, his first novel in a fictional series about national park wardens and their battles to protect our country's special places. This author, who was born and raised in Gander, Newfoundland, worked for more than three decades as a park warden in Canada, including work in six national parks on both east and west coasts, the North and the Rocky Mountains. He retired in 2012, but remains passionate and loyal to protected areas.

Many local residents will remember Mercer when he was based here in Chéticamp from 1985 to 1987. His first novel, set along the world-famous Cabot Trail in Cape Breton Highlands National Park, tells the story of the park wardens' battles with a notorious poacher who has a reputation for letting nothing get in his way and the local communities who view poaching as part of their way of life. Battling egos, greed and corruption, the park wardens are drawn into an intricate game of cat and mouse that takes a turn no one could have imagined.

This work of fiction is full of suspense, captivating you and does not let go. It is like being caught in an undertow. You try to put it down and it pulls you back, as you cannot resist turning the pages and seeing what happens in the next chapter. Set in our very own backyard and although a story of fiction, familiar names and places that originate from our community makes it all that more interesting. During the twists and unexpected turns in the book, at times you can almost feel as if you are right there along with the characters.


I had the opportunity to connect with Mercer and we spoke of what inspired this author to write this mystery novel, "My main inspiration to write the book was a desire to write the eastern equivalent to a book written by Sid Marty called *Men for the Moun-*

tains. It was a book that inspired many young people to join the Warden Service and I know my own copy was read and reread many times. That book was great but it was focussed entirely on the Mountain National Parks and emphasized the male role in the Warden Service. I was keen to show an east coast perspective that included both women and men." He continued, "I was born and raised in Newfoundland but after joining

Parks, I was very eager to work in as many national parks as I could during my career, and Cape Breton was one stop along the journey."

"Cape Breton was amazing but also presented many challenges with the rampant poaching of deer, moose and salmon in the park, perhaps not unlike what was going on in some of the other parks I worked in, except it seemed to be almost non-stop," said Mercer. He added, "Cape Breton overwhelmed me in many regards because here was this iconic Canadian national park known for the Cabot Trail and the amazing Highlands, yet it had this dark underbelly of poaching that really did have the potential to compromise what the park was established to protect — namely wildlife and wilderness."



Mercer continues to be passionate about parks and protected areas and this passion forms the backdrop for much of his non-fiction writing which can be followed at writenature.com.
